



Down syndrome is a naturally occurring genetic difference caused by an extra chromosome. Babies with Down syndrome are born in every country to parents of all ages, races, religions and backgrounds.

Everyone with Down syndrome has a learning disability, it takes longer to learn new information and master skills but with greater inclusion, our young people now have the opportunity to fulfil their potential. Children with Down syndrome usually take longer to learn to talk, so may use Makaton sign language, and are generally great at letting you know what they need!

You may never have met anyone with Down syndrome and may be unsure how to react, what to say or to do... the bottom line is that our children are not that different to yours... they need to be loved and cared for. They are more alike than different to other children; they want to have friends, to belong, to be included and to enjoy life.

You may be nervous or unsure about inviting a child with Down syndrome or indeed any learning disability to play at your home or to a party, please don't be – have a chat with their parents or teacher, and you'll find there's nothing to be worried about.

Whilst people with Down syndrome share some common physical characteristics, each is a unique individual with their own strengths and weaknesses, own character and personality, all influenced by their families, friends and life - just like the rest of us.
